

Domus Dei

Feature: Sainte-Chapelle, Paris, France



It's hard to believe that this exquisite house of God with walls of stained glass was built nearly 800 years ago (1238-1248). It is the finest example of Gothic art and architecture imaginable and a symbol of the Capetian dynasty that ruled France for several hundred years.

The Chapel was commissioned by King St. Louis IX as a monumental reliquary for the relic of the Crown of Thorns that he had brought back from the Crusades in 1239. The walls of stained glass were made possible by the innovation of the external flying buttress which allowed church walls to be thinner to accommodate stained glass.

Sadly, Sainte-Chapelle was vandalized by the partisans of the satanic French Revolution (1791-94) and was then *de-commissioned* and secularized when they outlawed state religion. It is now a museum operated by the French state.
